





- Scheduled 4 usability sessions for next week





President Obama signed the Plain Writing Act of 2010 on October 13, 2010. The law requires that federal agencies use clear government communication that the public can understand and use. On January 18, 2011, he issued Executive Order 13563 -Improving Regulation and Regulatory Review, which states that our regulatory system "must ensure that regulations are accessible, consistent, written in plain language, and easy to understand."




